














# UPGRADING OUR LEARNING SPACES

As part of our ongoing commitment to providing an enriching and inspiring environment for your children, we're excited to announce several upgrades across our school. These changes are rooted in our belief in the Reggio Emilia philosophy, where the environment serves as a "third teacher," guiding and enhancing each child's exploration, learning, and growth.

**Big Mirror:** Next to the sandpit on the first floor, we've installed a large mirror. Children enjoy dressing up in costumes from the nearby shelf and admiring themselves in the mirror. This setup helps children explore self-awareness and the concept of reflection. Parents, teachers, and nannies also love catching a glimpse of themselves in this mirror. Be sure to check it out the next time you visit!

**Mini Outdoors:** Behind the IT and N1 classrooms, we've identified a space with potential to become a mini garden. We've set up different features, including a ball system, a water system, and musical instruments mounted on the wall. Wind chimes made from shells and bamboo create soothing sounds as they sway in the wind. We've also added colorful mica paper that reflects vibrant patterns on the floor when the sunlight hits it. A small sandpit adds texture and diversity to this mini outdoor area, creating a sensory-rich space for exploration.







New Sandpit: Our treehouse remains a beloved feature, with children enjoying the thrill of climbing up and down, imagining it as a boat or a pirate ship. However, we saw potential in the spacious area beneath the treehouse, which has now been transformed into a new sandpit. The children love building sandcastles and having a special new corner in the garden for play and discovery.

The Hobbit House: The Hobbit House, previously known for its blue door, now features a freshly painted red door, along with added lights, chairs, a table, and a grassy floor inside. We've placed baskets under both windows, perfect for imaginative play, whether it's a fruit shop or a restaurant. Recently, we set it up as a fruit shop, sparking endless creativity among the children.

Construction Corner: Next to the outdoor kitchen setup, we've added tables and shelves to store new materials for construction play. These include tools like safety helmets, drills, hammers, wrenches, screwdrivers, and binoculars. Children love putting on tool belts and pretending to be mini construction workers, fostering both imaginative play and motor skill development.

The Stream: Children have always loved playing in the stream splashing, climbing, and adjusting water flow through the pipes. To enhance this area, we've recemented the stream, added new pebbles, and built a small bridge. Children can explore the newly improved stream area, making water play even more exciting.


















**Obstacle Corner:** To the left of the treehouse, we've utilized the trees to create an obstacle corner. Ropes have been added for children to hold onto as they walk across rows of tires. This setup encourages balance and coordination, making it a fun challenge, especially for older children.



Water System: We previously had two water systems attached to the walls. Now, we've introduced a ground-level water system. With various containers and large pipes, children can explore how water flows from one container to another. To make it even more engaging, we occasionally add colored water, allowing the children to mix colors as they pour water through the pipes. This creates a fun, hands-on learning experience that fosters curiosity and creativity.



Rabbits: You may have heard about them from your children or read about them on Storypark, but we're excited to officially introduce our two playful bunnies: Mochi, the white rabbit, and Oreo, the black-and-white one. Initially shy, they've grown more comfortable around the children, who are learning to pet them gently, feed them, and observe their behavior. Occasionally, the bunnies hop around, and the children love imitating them by hopping along. The bunnies truly bring joy to our days at school. When the bunnies choose to retreat, it provides a valuable opportunity for the children to learn about respecting the needs and boundaries of other living creatures.

# NURSERY 1

Our Nursery 1 Little Pumpkins had so much fun diving into the world of tigers over the past term! We explored what makes these big cats so special and learned about their unique black and orange stripes, which help them blend into their surroundings. We compared tiger stripes to other animals, like zebras. and noticed that while tigers and zebras have stripes, ladybugs have spots. A little ladybug in our garden helped us see how different animals can look! We also checked our clothes to find stripes and spots some of us looked like tigers, zebras, or ladybugs right in the classroom.

We learned that tigers are super quiet when hunting for food, creeping up slowly like little ninjas, so we practiced being sneaky tigers by tiptoeing around the classroom without making a sound. We found out that most tigers live far away in a country called India and even looked at a map to find it, which made us feel like explorers. We were amazed to discover that tigers are the biggest cats, even bigger than lions, and unlike most cats, they love swimming! Thinking about tigers jumping into water while pet cats avoid it made us laugh.

It was wonderful to see the children's enthusiasm throughout this project. They were captivated by tiger facts, eagerly asked questions, and shared their own ideas, like pretending to be tigers during free play or spotting patterns everywhere they went. This project sparked their natural curiosity and imagination, helping them connect new knowledge with their everyday experiences.

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# NURSERY 2 Our Mosquito Project by: Ms. Lilis

We began by exploring the anatomy of mosquitoes, discovering their delicate wings, long legs, and the differences between male and female mosquitoes. The children were particularly intrigued by the idea that female mosquitoes bite to obtain blood, while male mosquitoes feed on nectar. This sparked engaging discussions about the role mosquitoes play in nature and their connection to viruses like dengue, malaria, and Zika.

One of the highlights of the project was creating our own mosquitoes using pinecones. Each child added their photo as the "head" of the mosquito, giving these creations a personal touch and bringing the lesson to life. This hands-on activity not only reinforced their understanding of mosquito anatomy but also encouraged creativity and fine motor skills.

We also delved into mosquito prevention, learning about the types of mosquitoes such as Aedes, Culex, Culicinae, and Mansonia. The children practiced saying these challenging names with great enthusiasm, building their vocabulary and confidence. As part of this learning, we created a special "potion" using basil, lemon, and lemongrass—plants believed to repel mosquitoes. The children loved the fresh smell and the sensory experience of working with natural materials.

Our learning extended to games and role-playing, which made the experience memorable. We splashed red water onto mosquito drawings to represent controlling the mosquito population, but we always emphasized kindness to animals. This sparked thoughtful conversations about the importance of balancing nature and health, teaching the children compassion and responsibility.

As we close this project, it is inspiring to reflect on how much the children have grown in their understanding and ability to connect knowledge to real-world challenges. They have developed not only scientific knowledge but also empathy, collaboration, and creative problem-solving skills. This project is a reminder of the power of curiosity and the importance of teaching children to care for their environment and community. 






# KINDERGARTEN 1



I have to let go because the child is capable of exponential abilities ready to emerge with our intentional guidance, together with the environment and their curiosities. With the rich and outstanding environment we have here, we became mindful-mindful of the choices we make, the materials we use, and their impact on our children and the planet we live on. It is embedded in and practiced how to be sustainable and how to show respect to the environment, the materials we use, and the culture we have.

The beauty of nature education is being able to appreciate and respect what we have. We strive to create nature warriors, children who value the importance of taking care of the planet in our own little ways. The most common belief is that we make the most effective nature warriors by making them first nature lovers. Alam Atelier mindfully lets children experience the magic of nature in and outside the classroom. 
